Dear Members,

An update about AAUW National... Some of you are aware that AAUW National has been making major changes to return the organization to a position of fiscal sustainability. The new Strategic Plan is a guiding force in focusing AAUW activities. A significant reduction was made in annual expenses (\$24M to\$16M) and staff (107 to 40). AAUW leadership is increasing transparency to ensure that members know and understand the changes being made. Stronger revenue pipelines are being developed that are based on realistic goals and expectations for the organization. And, AAUW is increasing its public/external face through high-level presence at conferences, initiatives, and media, thus increasing awareness and support of AAUW and its mission. This is an exciting time of change and improvement, with Kim Churches at the helm. I encourage you to attend the Regional Convention being planned in June 2020 to hear Kim talk more about the progress being made and successes being achieved.

We can support AAUW, at the national level, through our contributions to the overall organization. Please take the time to read the Funds article by Glenda Schnirring for a new idea to raise funds for national level programing efforts, in the absence of a 2020 State Convention silent auction.

Our member support works together with national sponsorships to provide opportunities to enhance economic security for women. One success story is the grant AAUW received from the Coca-Cola Foundation. The agreement was to train at least 100,000 women by the end of August. The free, online Work Smart program and in-person workshops trained over 102,700 people. And, Coca-Cola is so impressed with AAUW and its effort to reach this grant goal, it invited AAUW to submit a proposal for an additional, one-year \$500,000 grant! The results: 72% of those trained reported higher levels of confidence in salary negotiation; 98% reported finding the information useful and relevant; and 60% reported putting the skills they learned into practice at work. Our Hasting Branch contributions to AAUW National support this success story! Let's continue our national support, and seek ways to support our local community.

Hastings Branch Finds New Way to Support AAUW National Fund Programs

The underpinnings of AAUW's purpose is to have a nationwide impact on advancing the lives of women and girls. "AAUW Funds" does this. The Hastings Branch donates \$1,000 annually from its budget, PLUS gives through a giftbasket, silent auction program conducted at the AAUW MN State Convention. There will not be a state convention in 2020, in the traditional format of bringing state members to one location.

Without the silent auction proceeds from a state convention, the Hastings Branch proposes a new way to raise additional dollars for a National contribution. We will hold a raffle at our upcoming Holiday Party on December 9th.

Member-donated gifts will be displayed at the party. Opportunities to "win" gifts will be made to everyone in attendance. We anticipate gathering an amount of money equivalent to what we historically raised through the past state convention silent auctions. The last convention baskets yielded \$355, credited to the Hastings Branch. It's our goal to raise at least that much.

AAUW Funds support the following:

- Leadership Programs for young women, such as the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL), to which the Hastings Branch now sends one or more college students;
- Start Smart, a training program to assist women in negotiating salaries and benefits;
- *Elect Her, a training program that teaches young women how and why to run for elected office;*
- Fellowships and Grants to academically gifted women enrolled in advanced studies, nationally and internationally (including 8 women in Minnesota University settings);
- Research into emerging issues facing women, such as "Women's Success in Engineering and Computing" (2015), and "Graduating to a Pay Gap" (2012);
- Legacy Advocacy, supporting protection of the legal rights of those facing sex discrimination. This program recently assisted in a suit filed against U of M Duluth's coaching program; and

• Public Policy, supporting policies and laws for women's equality.

Very few, if any, organizations do all this nationally. The Hastings Branch exists, in part, for the furtherance of these endeavors, contributing to the financial health of each program. Dollars raised at the Holiday Party will be sent to the AAUW National office to support programs demonstrating the greatest need at this time.

Member for 50 years Shirley Tammen



What a wonderful surprise to be recognized as a fifty year member of AAUW at our September Hastings Branch meeting. I do not count my life in years; therefore I had no idea how long my membership has been. I just know AAUW has been a very important and meaningful part of my adult life.

In my mid-twenties while living and working in New Ulm, I saw an article in our local newspaper about AAUW and its role in the community, as well as its ties to issues related to Minnesota and the nation. I had been looking for an organization that focused on empowering women. After attending that first meeting, I was on board! Within two years, I became a local board member. The goals were not as widespread as now, but programing did include current, national issues and women's role in society.

Following our move to Hastings in 1965, a few new friends approached me about forming an AAUW branch in Hastings. With three preschoolers at home, I really needed an organization that would include fellowship and challenges that would stimulate my mind. Because of my experience with the New Ulm branch, I happily agreed to move forward with our initial plans for incorporation. There were five of us who served on the committee, with Sue Tanner as chair. It took about one year to put together all of the tools we needed to begin- a charter, non-profit status, bi-laws, AAUW mission based programing and a financial plan compliant with the state and national AAUW.

In March 1970, twenty-three Hastings women became charter members at the Regina Hospital meeting room. The value of my time in AAUW is priceless and I thank the National board for this lifetime membership in AAUW.

Gail Glashan shared a most interesting video from Britta Johnson, one of the young women who attended the NCCWSL conference in 2019. The Hastings Branch has supported 9 women since 2015, so they could attend this exciting conference.

Margaret Goderstad reported there are many things going on in the Hastings community. Look for LeDuc Holiday Teas, events at the Hastings Art Center, a concert by the River Valley Band, and THRIVE events. There are also events supporting United Way, Hastings and Hastings Family Service.

The total earnings from the garage sale, held in September, was \$2,967.25.
