Below is Kimberly Churches, AAUW CEO, statement against racism:

AAUW joins the country in mourning the losses of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor and countless other people of color who have been unjustly killed across our nation. Our country needs healing. But healing will only come with justice. As an organization we condemn racism.

September 28, 2020 AAUW Meeting - Hastings Branch (Zoom)

- 1. President Lisa Hedin called the meeting to order at 6:38 pm. She thanked everyone (approximately 42 members on screen) for continuing as members under such difficult circumstances and also for their efforts with Zoom.
- 2. Mary Charlson gave the Treasurer's report. The current checkbook balance is \$5,998.37, reflecting deposits for 86 paid members and of \$1,355 donations already received in lieu of the annual garage sale. Expenses paid included the portions of dues paid to National and State, as well as the branch's share of the payment for the evening's presentation. Mary noted that included in the balance is \$1,000 returned to branch from NCCWSL (canceled for the year), which is earmarked for the next NCCWSL award(s). Donations in lieu of the garage sale are requested by Oct 31.

To date, approximately a third of members have donated. A total of \$2,500 is needed for the award of our local scholarship, and \$40 is the suggested donation. Thank you to all who have already donated. Motion to approve: Second: Cindy Toppin. Treasurer's report approved.

3. Committee Reports

Membership: Kathy Palmer thanked members for continued support. Current year's budget was based on the assumption of having 85 members, which has now been surpassed (86), however, she encouraged continued efforts to recruit new members. It was noted that AAUW, generally, needs to recruit many more younger members to continue. The current average age of an AAUW member is 73.

Program: Danna Shultz reported the program is set for the year (planned to be via Zoom until conditions permit us to meet again in person). Derrick Jaeger is speaking on Diversity in October. In November, State Senator Karla Bingham will discuss the election and, also, Kari Jaeger on Hastings Reads. Peggy Horsch is working on a virtual Holiday Party for December. Margaret Anderson Kelliher, currently Commissioner of the MN Department of Transportation, formerly DLF Speaker of the House, will speak in January. Rich Manke will speak on Sundown Towns in February, and some descendants of one of the first black families to live in Hastings (Cooper) will also attend. Colleen Fritsch will speak on Dementia and Friends in March. In April, it is hoped we will be able to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Hastings Branch at the Public House. In May, Amy Browender will present "College Possible."

Garage Sale - 2020 Plan and Additional Fundraising Initiatives: Ceil Strauss reiterated the need for \$40 donations by October 31 to replace the garage sale, our main fundraiser for the local scholarship. In addition, at the last Board meeting, Pat Powers and Gail Glashan volunteered to work with Ceil Strauss and Jackie Rigelman on alternative fundraising possibilities. Other members interested in this effort are invited to reach out to Ceil or Jackie, either to join the group or with a particular idea. All ideas welcome!

Public Policy: Pat Powers said most important right now is to vote, either in person on election day, Tuesday, November 3, or as soon as possible by absentee ballot, which can be mailed in via USPS or delivered to City Hall or Government Center (Hastings voters). (At the end of the meeting, Camille Nelson also told of her experience that day of going to the Dakota Co. Government Center to vote early, in-person, by absentee ballot. No lines.) Pat also mentioned that she is State AAUW Membership Chair and would welcome any ideas from membership on recruiting new and younger members.

Gad-Abouts: New Co-Chairs are needed. Lisa welcomed anyone who would like to take on this important function of camaradie building in the branch. An example of Zoom-Gad-Abouting: Maybe someone has an idea for a presentation to watch together and to discuss afterwards. Someone would need to take charge of publicizing it and organizing the Zoom logistics.

Book Group: Shirley Tammen reported on meetings this summer at the river, which went well. The next meeting is planned for 1:30pm on Monday, October 12, behind the Library, weather permitting. There There... by Tommy Orange, novel by a Native American writer will be discussed.

AAUW Funds: Glenda Schnirring read the announcement of the May scholarship award to Amy Roach, 2020 Hastings High School graduate, who has enrolled at University of Southern California, majoring in political science and chemistry, a combination which she hopes will be useful to her as an advocate for change in pursuing social justice for all. Glenda said she is confident we will be in a good position, financially, to award another scholarship this year.

Community: Margaret Goderstad expressed congratulations to HPAAC for their very successful virtual gala on Sunday, September 27. She reminded of the Coffee Concert at the Hastings Art Center, September 29, at 10:30. The Coffee Concerts are being held again, with a limit of 50 people (preregistered), observing social distancing. The Orange Dragon gallery in Prescott is again open, Wed - Sun, 11 - 5, displaying local artists.

Diversity: Marlys Schmitt encouraged members to participate in Hastings THRIVE events and the related book events. Derrick Jaeger of the YMCA is also doing equity labs on the issues.

Branch Strategic Plan: Lisa West apologized for not being able to present something that night, but promised to have an update developed for the next meeting.

President Hedin thanked Mary Ellen Fox and Gail Glashan for their efforts with Zoom that evening, and also expressed special gratitude to Tina Folch, who was responsible for the behind-the-scenes work in arranging the logistics for the evening's presentation.

Motion: Kathy O'Keefe. Second: Linda Bindman The meeting was adjourned at 7:15 pm.

At 7:30 pm, members of the Dakota County League of Women's Voters (Co-sponsors of the evening's program) joined the Zoom meeting. Audrey Johnson, classically trained opera singer, gave a welcome and introduction to the video
