If you can, come early (any time after 6:30 pm) to mingle with Club members and enjoy a treat provided by them. I asked faculty advisor, Kari Jaeger, to give us some information about the Club. Here is what she shared:

"The HHS Feminism Club was started in 2015 by students. The Club meets once or twice a month and works to raise awareness about (local and international) women's rights issues. It is our goal to help people take a stand, speak up about what they believe in, and stay educated about injustices around the world. During meetings, we discuss problems that women face internationally and within our own communities and provide steps that the group can take to help solve those problems (such as information on local rallies or ways to raise awareness within Hastings). Feminism Club provides a safe place for people to voice their concerns and stories in an open-minded and supportive environment.

Over the past 7 years, we've partaken in many activities, such as co-hosting a presentation with AAUW about sexual assault on college campuses: hosting an informational event for the community on sex trafficking; completing service projects for a women's shelter; raising funds for Girl Up so that girls in Malawi can bike to school; taking a selfdefense class; learning from guest speakers about women in politics, education for girls around the world, transfeminism, eating disorders, and history of feminism; watching videos related to feminism; reading articles/essays; and discussing current events. Feminism Club also works to redefine feminism in a more positive light, and to show Hastings High School that anyone can be and should be a feminist."

Sounds familiar, right? That's why there will be continuing outreach to the Club to keep the momentum and engagement on-going; hopefully, long into the future. One way to support the Club is through its T-Shirt sale. The sale is open to all and is one more piece to round out your "feminism closet." The program will feature 2 speakers from the Minneapolis Branch of the Federal Reserve, Katherine Lim and Vanessa Palmer. The Federal Reserve has been doing bang-up work in the gender inequity area so we are very fortunate to have their expertise so close. I asked them to provide a brief synopsis of the presentation:

"The pandemic recession presented large and unprecedented challenges for workers and businesses. Unlike previous recessions, women's employment suffered larger losses than men's. School and childcare closures as well as loss of informal care led to increased demands on parents' time with a disproportionate effect on mothers.

On October 24th, the Hastings American Association of University Women and High School Feminism Club will host Katherine Lim and Vanessa Palmer from the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis. The speakers will give an overview of long-standing contributions to the gender earnings gap in the United States followed by a discussion of research on women's employment and labor force participation during the pandemic. Understanding the effect of pandemic-related public health concerns, government-mandated shutdowns, and widespread societal changes on women's careers and lives is vital to our ability to achieve a full economic recovery."

Treasurer's Report

We continue to be very healthy financially. Our beginning balance this month was \$11,260.11. Our income this month was all related to new members and renewing members. Our expenses are mostly related to paying National and State dues. Other expenses were related to programing and promotion. We purchased a new \$3,000 CD. Our current balance is \$7,718.63.

AAUW Business Meeting Minutes September 26, 2022 Location: St. Philip's Lutheran Church and Zoom

Approximately 65 in person attendees and 8 Zoom attendees

- 1. **New member introductions.** We had 8 new members over the summer and an additional 5 join recently, including our first ever student member Ashley Sarne. This brings our total membership to 98 total!
- 2. **Call to Order/President's Message.** Meeting was called to order at 7:01 pm.

We are re-entering the clip board era! Hospitality signups being passed around tonight. Please sign up for an event to bring treats, about 2 dozen. Gad-Abouts will have the same structure this year; if you have an activity you participate in, please invite the rest of us! Get a blurb about it in the TWIG. Generally, these events are during the day but do not have to be, we are looking to have about 2-3 of these types of events this year.

There will be a school board open forum at the end of October – more details to come.

3. Treasurer's Report. Board accepted the Treasurer's Report at the September 6th Board Meeting. Ended last month with \$11, 360.11. Income deposits from membership dues. PRESS RELEASE

RARE: STORIES OF DIS-EASE TO BE PERFORMED IN HASTINGS, MN

On Saturday, October 15th at 7:30pm, Sod House Theater of Minneapolis will bring their production of *RARE: Stories of Dis-ease* to the Hastings Arts Center. The play is being performed to help bring a greater awareness and deeper understanding of the medical, economic, psychological, and social challenges facing people with rare diseases. Act 2 will be an interactive discussion of medical professionals and people who have been affected by a rare disease, giving a short presentation and answering questions from the audience. Tickets for the play are free, but the number of seats are limited so you must reserve your tickets online at https://www.sodhousetheater.org/rare All reserved tickets will be available at the will call desk. A free will offering will be available with 100% of the proceeds going to rare disease organizations.


The play was developed through a collaboration by The University of Minnesota's Center for Orphan Drug Research and the Department of Theater Arts and Dance. The show creators adapted the Greek tragedy, *Philoctetes*, to tell the story of the challenges faced by people diagnosed with a rare disease. Philoctetes was a warrior noted in the Iliad, who was on his way to the Trojan War when a serpent bit him. The cries of pain from his wound were so great and the smell so noxious that he was abandoned on an island by his countrymen to live his life in isolation. The theme of abandonment and isolation resonate strongly with people who have a rare disease as well as their families and loved ones.

Kevin Kling, best known for his popular commentaries on National Public Radio's *All Things Considered* and his storytelling stage shows like *Tales from the Charred Underbelly of the Yule Log*, is the author of the play. Kling shared, "This production has truly been a passion project for all of us and has been woven from the accounts of so many courageous individuals who have lived the experience of rare disease and who have personally shared their stories with us." Luverne Seifert, Head of BA Theater Performance at the University of Minnesota is the director of the play, along with dramaturg and University of Minnesota theater professor, Sonja Kuftinec.

The Sod House Theater Company is a local performance group that specializes in creating professional theater experiences in close collaboration with Minnesota communities in order to illuminate timely and relevant issues and create an empowering space for public dialogue and reflection. In addition to Hastings, performance locations include; U of M Twin Cities, Minneapolis, Crookston, Rochester, and Morris MN, Prescott WI, and Fargo ND.
