What a big end of 2023 we had!

A record 71 in attendance at our Holiday Brunch, after which our giving overflowed into an extra surprise delivery to Hastings Family Service Youth Fund!

We started our month off at a very strong balance of \$19,762 and ended the year at a still quite healthy \$14,662. The AAUW Greatest Need Fund payment was made. Checks have been sent to our 2 Scholarship recipients – USC & Inver Hills Community Students for a total of \$3,000. Other expenses related to speakers, programing and visibility/membership were also paid.




Book Club Shirley Tammen


who always seems to be disappointed in Darius. The author will be speaking in the evening at the Hastings Arts Center on February 12th, 2024.

Sandra Day O'Connor, What a Life!

Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman Supreme Court Justice, passed away December 1, 2023. She was a trailblazer for all women as a student, wife, mother, and worker. She grew up on a ranch in Arizona and lived 32 miles from the nearest school so she went to live with her grandmother in El Paso. There she attended a girl's school for elementary school and graduated from Austin High School in El Paso. She went on to Stanford and graduated with a BA in Economics followed by a law degree near the top of her class and she wrote for the Law Review.

It was the 1950's. No law firm would hire a woman. She essentially took a volunteer position as deputy county attorney and shared an office with a secretary. After a few months, she earned a small salary. Her husband was drafted and sent to Germany.

She moved to Germany and worked as an attorney for the Army. When they moved back, they settled in Arizona.

They had 3 sons and she took 5 years off to raise them but during those years she became very active in republican politics. She worked on the Goldwater campaign. She then took a job as assistant Attorney General of Arizona. She was appointed to the Arizona Senate to fill a vacancy and she rose to become the majority leader. The first woman in the United States to hold that position.

She was a great negotiator. After 2 terms she left the Senate. A year later she was appointed to the Maricopa County Supreme Court. All of her history brought her to the shortlist for the Supreme Court when Ronald Reagan could appoint a new justice, the first woman on the Supreme Court. She was confirmed in a 99 to 0 vote in the Senate. She shouldered incredible responsibility to represent women. That was 1981. It wasn't until 1993 that Ruth Bader Ginsburg joined the court that she felt relief from the media. She was a conservative. She voted with William Rehnquist most of the time. As the court became more conservative, she often became the swing vote. O'Connor knew the difficulties of being a woman with all the barriers she had overcome. She hired women as her clerks and demanded no excuses for mistakes from them. She took an interest in their lives. She brought a perspective to the court's decisions that was shaped by a woman and accepted by all. Title IX was strengthened against sex discrimination for both men and women by her decisions. She did not seek to end "Roe v. Wade" but placed some limitations without undue burden on the woman's right to abortion. She voted as the swing vote in Bush v. Gore. In 2005 she retired from the court due to her husband's health. In 2009 she was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Obama.

She continued to be very active in retirement. She heard cases part-time in federal courts and courts of appeal and as a visiting judge. She became the ceremonial Chancellor of the College of William and Mary, a member of the Iraq Study Group, board member of the Rockefeller Foundation, chair of the Jamestown 2007 celebration.

She taught a course at the U of Arizona in 2006. Later the University renamed their school of law the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law. She was honored as a visiting fellow at Stanford. TV's Jeopardy had her video answers for a show in 2014. She created a website Our Courts and offered civic lessons to students and teachers. Lee H Hamilton and O'Connor co-chaired the Campaign for the Civic Mission of Schools. The Daily Show with Jon Stewart had her appear to promote her website. That initiative morphed into iCivics for educators of middle and high school students. She served on boards of trustees; she was a founding co-chair of the National Advisory Board at the National Institute for Civil Discourse after the Gabby Gifford shooting in Arizona.

She survived breast cancer in 1988. Her husband had Alzheimer's for 20 years until his death in 2009. Her friends and colleagues noticed her forgetfulness in 2013. She moved to assisted living and announced retirement from all public life in 2018. She passed away Dec 1, 2023 at age 93. President Biden said she was an "American Icon" dedicated to public service and the "bedrock American principle of an independent judiciary."

January - Intellectual Freedom and Preservation of Diverse Voices in Literature

Our upcoming January AAUW meeting includes welcoming guest speaker, Librarian Christy Wayne, who will be presenting on her topic entitled "Book Selection Process in Dakota County Libraries." This topic is one that invites each of us to recognize and acknowledge that the American Library Association plays a key role in advocating for intellectual freedom as well as the preservation of diverse voices in literature.

Preserving intellectual freedom and diverse voices in literature allows for the availability of diverse perspectives to enhance the understanding of different cultures, ideas, and experiences.

Reading a range of voices challenges readers to think critically, to ask questions, as well as question assumptions, all while gaining a greater understanding of the world around them. Diverse literature allows individuals from all backgrounds to see themselves represented which fosters a sense of belonging as well as a validation of their experiences. Such exposure promotes understanding and empathy by breaking down misconceptions and stereotypes about different cultures, identities, and perspectives. Intellectual freedom and diverse literature have educational value as they offer a more comprehensive view of history, society, and human experiences. Literature has the ability to influence societal norms and attitudes as diverse voices contribute to social dialogue that encourages acceptance and inclusivity. When readers have access to a wide variety of literature from which they make their own choices about what to read, their intellectual freedom is preserved, diverse perspectives are considered, critical thinking skills are developed, and principles of free expression are exercised - all of which contribute to a more open, informed, and well-rounded society.

- The ALA is a key advocate for intellectual freedom and their website offers valuable information and resources on the importance of preserving access to a wide range of materials.

- American Booksellers for Free Expression (ABFFE)
 - This joint statement emphasizes the value and importance of freedom of expression in today's libraries. In addition, insights are shared pertaining to the harmful effects of censorship.
- 3. National Coalition Against Censorship (NCAC)
 - The NCAC is an organization dedicated to defending the freedom to read and their website offers various resources and case studies related to book censorship.
- 4. "Censorship and Literature" by John S. Simmons
 - This book explores the history and impact of censorship on literature while also shedding light on the value of preserving intellectual freedom and diverse voices.




