Educational Strategies in Changing Classrooms

Young Sil Kim Allgor will be the featured speaker at the May 19 meeting of the Hastings branch of the American Association of University Women.

Born in South Korea and adopted at the age of 11 to the small MN town of Sleepy Eye, Young Sil Kim Allgor is a veteran teacher of the deaf/hard of hearing with 40 years of experience mostly in the itinerant setting. She taught students from birth to age 21 programs as the only teacher of the deaf/hard of hearing for 15 years before teaching at St Paul Public Schools with students who were primarily first and second-generation immigrants with mild/moderate hearing loss.

Allgor earned her Bachelor of Arts degree at Augustana University in Sioux Falls, SD, and Master of Arts in Instructional Design at St Mary's University in Winona. While teaching in St. Paul, she struggled to effectively advocate for and educate her students in the inner city.

To expand her knowledge in this area she participated in Seeking Equity in Educational Diversity (SEED) programs in the Twin Cities for the past 20 years. Within the program, she discovered how students' race, culture, and identities affect their learning styles and outcomes.

Currently she is a Professional Development trainer for Education Minnesota. In her biography she





Summer Meetings:


We will take a break in June but we will meet on July 14th and August 11th down by the river (east

May 2025 AAUW Hastings Newsletter – Diversity

May is Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders (AANHPI) Heritage Month in the United States. A celebration of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States. Asian/Pacific encompasses all of the Asian Continent and the Pacific islands of Melanesia (New Guinea, New Caledonia, Vanuatu, Fiji and the Solomon Islands), Micronesia (Marianas, Guam, Wake Island, Palau, Marshall Islands, Kiribati, Nauru and the Federated States of Micronesia) and Polynesia (New Zealand, Hawaiian Islands, Rotuma, Midway Islands, Samoa, American Samoa, Tonga, Tuvalu, Cook Islands, French Polynesia and Easter Island).

The commemorative month originated in Congress, but not without some challenges. In 1977 the first resolution calling for commemorations was introduced but not passed. After a second submission was successful, the first Asian/Pacific Islander week was celebrated in May 1979 and was expanded to a month in 1992. May was chosen to commemorate the first Japanese to the United State on May 7, 1834 and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants.

ons.html While some of the links are currently broken, I particularly enjoyed the <u>Colorful Realm:</u> Japanese Bird and Flower Paintings by Ito Jakuchi, Go For Broke: The 442nd Infantry Regiment, and Highlights from the Veterans History Project.

Consider an in-person visit to the Minneapolis Institute of Art (MIA) to enjoy the historical and contemporary creative achievements of AANHPI contained in their comprehensive collection. A sample of what is currently on display are <u>Transcendent Clay: The Kondo Family's Path</u> of Porcelain Innovations spanning almost a century of creativity; <u>From the Divine to the Mortal:</u> <u>Storytelling in Chinese Painting</u> from nearly 2,000 years ago during the Han Dynasty and <u>Catch of the</u> <u>Day: Humans and Marine Animals in Japan</u> exploring the sea creatures that permeate Japanese art and culture.
