Inclusion Benefits All - Perspectives and Strategies from an Intercultural Professor and Mom



Our September 22nd speaker is Basma Ibrahim DeVries, Ph.D., a professor of Communication Studies at Concordia University in

St. Paul, MN. Creating spaces of belonging and inclusion in these complex times requires heightened identity awareness, greater cultural sensitivity, and refined skills to bridge differences.

Drawing from her international experience as an intercultural communication professor, trainer and consultant, and as one of the founding moms of GiGi's Playhouse - Down Syndrome Achievement Center- Twin Cities, Basma will share professional and personal experiences in her quest to create greater inclusion in communities here and abroad. This interactive presentation provides information on relevant intercultural concepts and perspectives on 'differabilities' (Basma's preferred term), prompts attendees to explore the influences of their own multilayered identities, and offers strategies and tips for promoting more inclusivity in our lives.

Basma earned her Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota in Communication Studies, focusing her dissertation on Arab-American bicultural identity. She served on the national board of SIETAR-USA (Society for Intercultural Education, Training and Research), and co-founded SIETAR-Minnesota.

Basma is Egyptian-American and has spent time traveling, working, and leading student travel and service-learning courses in countries on 6 continents (she has not been to Antarctica yet!) She was the Intercultural Learning Circle Coordinator and Department Chair aboard the inaugural semester-long voyage of *The Scholar Ship*, where she was responsible for overseeing the intercultural competence development of students, staff and faculty from 50 countries on an oceangoing university.

Her publications include a co-authored book, Communication Highwire: Leveraging the Power of Diverse Communication
Styles (Intercultural Press) and Culture Detective: EGYPT, part of a web-based intercultural learning series, Cultural Detective

(www.culturaldetective.com).

Basma sees herself as a traveler, writer, photographer, rule-breaker, dreamer, artist, storyteller, activist, environmentalist, and optimist. Her happiest moments often involve adventures with her wonderful spouse, her two creative and adventurous sons, and her amazing extended family.


Book Club

The book club meets the second Monday of the month at the Pleasant Hill Library at 1:30pm in the Old Mill Ruins room. Please join us, all are welcome!!

We had two wonderful meetings this summer down by the river and despite the many trains going by had great discussions on *The Lost Ticket* by Freya Sampson and *Kamogawa Food Detectives* by Hisashi Kashiwai.

We started our 2025–26 year on Sept. 8 discussing Dinners with Ruth: A Memoir on the Power of Friendships by Nina Totenberg.



On Oct. 13 (Pleasant Hill Library at 1:30pm) we will be discussing *The Berry Pickers* by Amanda Peters. *The Berry Pickers* is a heartbreaking, riveting tale of Indigenous family separation. We follow an Indigenous Mi'kmaq family in Nova Scotia who travels every summer to Maine to pick

blueberries as migrant workers. In the summer of 1962, 4-year-old Ruthie, the youngest of the family's five children, disappears from the fields. The last to see her is the second youngest, 6-year-old Joe, who takes the loss especially hard and carries his guilt in the years to come.

For Nov. 10, we will be discussing Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson. This book is a memoir about Stevenson's career as a lawyer and his work for poor clients, largely focusing on his efforts to overturn the wrongful conviction of Walter McMillian for the murder of Ronda Morrison.



Stevenson began working on the case in the 1980s, while McMillian was on death row.

Mentor Opportunities at Hastings Middle School

Hastings Middle School through Communities in the Schools is seeking mentors. This is a great opportunity for AAUW Hastings to support 5th – 8th grade students. Last year mentors connected with students during their lunch periods (10:45 am to12:35pm) every other Thursday starting late in October or early November.

The students meet one on one with their mentor for about 25 minutes while eating their lunches in a large conference room. This time can include chatting, games (Uno, cribbage, Jenga, ...), coloring, or doing puzzles. The mentor will meet with four different students: one from each grade level, each mentoring session. Mentors are welcome to eat lunch at the same time.

2. Remove Barriers to Education and Work / DEI Goal 1: DEI: Identify and address obstacles that hinder access for underrepresented groups in our

community. Assure programing and book club selections focus on women's lives and the issues important to them.

Goal 2: Bolster participation of girls and women in the education systems-creating a STEM program working with the schools, Vocational and Red Wing Branch. (www.theworks.org)

Goal 3: Politically AAUW's priorities for federal action are chosen according to the criteria of critical need, strong member support, and potential for distinctive AAUW contribution. Update and distribute the two-minute Activist, contacting your members of Congress and your state legislators about pressing issues.

Hispanic Heritage Month

Hispanic Heritage Month is observed between September 15 – October 15. This is a month-long celebration of Hispanic and Latino history and culture. According to the U.S. Census Bureau the 2020 Latino population in the U.S. is over 60 million people, which is 18.9% of the total population (making them the largest racial or ethnic group). Hispanic Heritage recognition began with a week-long celebration in 1968 under President Johnson and was expanded to a month in 1986 under President Reagan.

Hispanic Heritage Month runs from 15 September into the middle of October. This is significant as many Central American countries celebrate their independence days within this time frame, with Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua recognizing independence on 15 September.

Take a minute and look through the Smithsonian American Women's History Museum website

(https://womenshistory.si.edu/topics/latinas) to

learn about Latina women and their impact on America. Highlights include Major Marisol Chalas National Guard Black hawk helicopter pilot, Jessica Govea fulltime organizer with the United Farm Workers, and Diosa Costello the Goddess of Broadway in 1939. Checkout Hispanic Heritage Month programming on PBS, including "Alma's Way" a new children program starting at the end of September, the "38th Hispanic Heritage Awards" on September 26, or "Julia Alvarez: A Life Reimagined" on October 3.

International Literacy Day

Annual celebrations of International Literacy Day (ILD) have taken place on 8 September since 1967 around the world to remind policy-makers, practitioners, and the public of the critical importance of literacy for creating a more literate, just, peaceful, and sustainable society. The theme of the 2025 celebration is **Promoting Literacy in the Digital Era**. This theme recognizes the risk of double marginalization – exclusion from traditional literacy and benefits of the digital age. UNESCO estimates that in 2024 739 million kids and adults worldwide lack basic literacy skills.

Lunch with Emma!

We took Emma Hagen, a USC student and our NCCWSL 2025 scholarship recipient, to lunch! We, Jan Junkman, Pat Powers, Jackie Rigelman and Gail Glashan, were very anxious to hear about Emma's experience attending NCCWSL 2025.

Due to the increased cost of hosting the conference, it was becoming unsustainable for the AAUW organization, so beginning this year, the conference was sponsored by NASPA. (NASPA, is the professional home for student affairs administrators in higher education.) AAUW remains involved in a limited capacity, primarily as an exhibitor and presenter at the conference.

Emma flew on the same flight as AAUW Ely's scholarship recipient, Gretchen. They shared an Uber from the airport, checked in to the conference and heard the keynote speaker Daria J. Willis, Ph.D. President *Howard Community College*. Following the keynote, Emma enjoyed dinner, then some fun time in the Terp Zone at the student union!

Emma attended and especially valued the breakout session about money management. Emma appreciated meeting women from various educational experiences, junior colleges and vocational schools, and learning about their experiences with leadership. (She described herself several times as 'adventurous' and proved it by going to college away from home, even traveling to Peru and Thailand for further educational opportunities, including volunteering there. While in Peru, Emma worked with a local nonprofit, helping develop a fundraising strategy to support children's education. Collaborating across cultures, she learned how diverse perspectives drive creative solutions.)

We were so pleased that Emma felt the conference was definitely worthwhile and that AAUW helped

her on the road to learn from many varied educational opportunities!

Emma is a very accomplished young woman, and we found her so genuine. Perhaps you saw her at one of her summer jobs, waitressing at the Lock and Dam for the past four years or working in the Hastings schools.
