Kathy has been at the Dakota County Attorney's Office for more than 25 years, serving in multiple roles including criminal division head and chief deputy. Prior to Dakota County, she was the county attorney in Lyon County and worked in private practice.

Ms. Keena graduated from Minnesota State University Moorhead with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and sociology and received her J.D. from Hamline University School of Law, now Mitchell Hamline School of Law.

County Attorney Kathy Keena will share insights about both adult and juvenile cases charged and prosecuted by the Dakota County Attorney's Office. She'll also discuss youth and adult diversion programs, crime trends and current homicide cases.

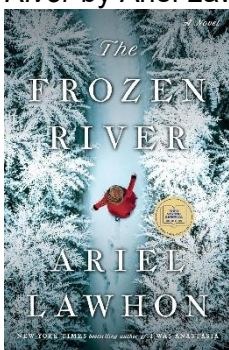

## **Book Club**

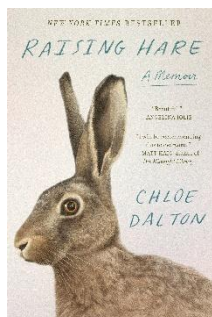
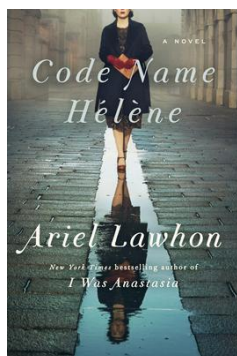

Our book selection for February 9<sup>th</sup> is *The Frozen River* by Ariel Lawhon. This is a historical fiction novel and mystery, inspired by the real-life diaries of 18th-century Maine midwife Martha Ballard, following her investigation into a body found in the frozen Kennebec River in 1789, uncovering secrets of scandal, power, and resilience within her community while navigating the limited role of women in that era.

2026 marks a century of national commemorations of Black history. Dr. Carter Godwin Woodson, George Cleveland Hall, William B. Hartgrove, Jesse E. Moorland, Alexander L. Jackson, and James E. Stamps institutionalized the teaching, study, dissemination, and commemoration of Black history when they founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH) on September 9, 1915.

In 1925, when Dr. Carter G. Woodson planned the inaugural week-long observance of Black history, he could hardly have anticipated the imprint he would leave on the world. From Negro History Week to Black History Month, Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) has carried forth the tradition, and the observances have become part of the warp and weft of American culture and increasingly the global community.

For our 100th theme, ASALH, the founders of Black History Month, urge us to explore the impact and meaning of Black history and life commemorations in transforming the status of Black peoples in the modern world. The ASALH remains strong through today. Check out their website <https://asalh.org/> for more information.

**International Day of Women and Girls in Science** will be recognized on 11 February. On 20 December 2013, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a resolution on science, technology and innovation for development, in which it recognized that full and equal access to and participation in science, technology and innovation for women and girls of all ages is imperative for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls.

Diversity in research expands the pool of talented researchers, bringing in fresh perspectives, talent and creativity. This Day is a reminder that women and girls play a critical role in science and technology communities and that their participation should be strengthened.

**Women and Girls in STEM** will be celebrated on 7 February from 11am-3pm at the Science Museum of Minnesota.
